Trakai

The Island Castle harks back to a time when Trakai was the capital of Lithuania. It was built in the 14th century, destroyed and then rebuilt from original plans in the 19th century. The town is famous for being the home of a jewish sect who were bought to Lithuania as body guards for one of the noblemen.

We rode into the town early this morning. It was chilly, but warming sunshine bathed our route. Few people were around when we arrived. We rode around the edge of the lake and across the bridge to the island dominated by the castle. Gauging by the number of moored paddle boats and yachts the lake must come alive in peak times.








ISLAND CASTLE



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
