## 10 Day Tour of Japan | March 2023 | Heather and Blayze


## **Blayze's Impressions**

After a stop at Osaka castle, we went to a very popular shopping centre called Shinsaibashi-Suji. I thought that this place would be more of a place to take photos, but it was fun to walk around the shops and, see everything. We bought a ticket for a place called "Mameshiba Cafe" and it is what it sounds like. A cafe with Japanese shiba inu dogs, we were told to come back in around 30 minutes. So we went to a restaurant where we both bought a sandwich because the shiba cafe didn't serve food, most likely because the dogs would bother everybody for the food. Then we went back to the cafe because it was time to meet the shibas.

We needed to take off our shoes and watch a safety video which told us what to do and what not to do. We stepped over a gate to stop the shiba inus from running into the busy streets of Osaka, and sat down. After a few minutes a white shiba inu called Tsurumame sat next to us. We scratched it for a few minutes until it started to growl a tiny bit, so I took my hand away with the thought that it didn't want to be scratched anymore but it still kept growling - we think it was just snoring. It kept on laying there and snoring with its eyes closed, eventually I tried saying hello to a red shiba, but when I tried to pat it they scooched over a bit to avoid my hand. These dogs are very independent and usually pick one human, and stay with that one. These dogs actually act a lot like cats. This cafe was an amazing experience and I recommend going for shiba lovers in the area.

## **Osaka**

A day I thought would be not so exciting has been very enjoyable. Firstly we went to Osaka Castle. This castle was started in 1583 by a Hideyoshi Toyotomi. At the time of its construction it was the largest and strongest in all of Japan. It was destroyed and rebuilt a number of times. It was even struck by lightning once. We only had an hour to explore the place and Blayze decided he wanted to climb to the observation deck. I knew I could not make it in a timely manner, so he went with another of the tour group — Stephen. I wandered the lower levels and admired some of the exhibits. It is a shame we did not have more time to dedicate to this great place.


