The 11th century Meersburg castle, is the oldest structurally intact castle in Germany. It sits imposingly on the bluff overlooking and surrounded by the town. After spending time in the main street yesterday, we walked around the winding cobbled streets in the higher section of the town. Many were steeply angled. This gave us lovely views across the lake. Every building has been lovingly maintained. The old water mill and various public buildings are absolutely beautiful. Many are draped in climbing plants and are rich in colour. The church bells peeled for ages and set the tone for the ancient old town. Everyone seemed to be smiling and laughing as they walked. We saw locals emerging from the church with their children dressed in white. Maybe it was a confirmation day.
