An interesting day where we immersed ourselves in physical exercise, art and culture, great food and some Dutch history.


It was bloody freezing outside when we woke up and by the time I put the rubbish bin out it was even colder. Heather suggested that I might need to soon locate the snow shoes.

All rugged up, we decided to visit one of the largest private natural recreation parks in The Netherlands. It's only 8 kms from Arnhem and covers an area of 54 square kilometers. The entrance fee was a little steep (approx \$25 each) but it covers entry to an art gallery and museum plus parking and the use of bikes to get around. We were not disappointed.

After parking our car in the extra large car park we were surprised to find that there are 1700 bikes for visitors to choose from. There were not many visitors (mainly school groups). The 3 kms ride to the museum was through open forest on a paved bike track. Luckily the terrain was flat because the bikes had only one gear.



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
Brrrrrrrr



We visited the park/museum which documented the natural history of the area and the work done by the Kroller-Muller family who regenerated the vegetation, built a major mansion and ensured that future generations would enjoy what De Hoge Velewe has to offer - the largest open green space in The Netherlands.

Thousands of visitors come to the park each year. Apparently being able to walk or bike ride through natural bush land is rare in The Netherlands. After the museum we enjoyed a warming Dutch pea, ham and sausage soup. It was just like the one Kelly makes. We sat near a lovely open fire. Yummy and warm.
