
Würzburg

At 7am this morning we made stop number two to the Hertz office. Our vehicle was duly supplied (with pleasant smiles from us) and we made our way out of Frankfurt. Half a day late but happy to be on our way, we set off for Würzburg, some 1.5 hours from Frankfurt. The area we are in now is in the Lower Frankconian area of the state of Bavaria. We saw little as we drove because we took the main highway and arrived at our house swap near to the centre of the town. The area around this apartment is not particularly impressive - in fact it's a bit scruffy really. However the flat itself is modern and has everything we need - small but adequate.
