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SHEEP AND FISH

It seems to us that Skye is populated by lots of sheep but not very many inhabitants. Large human settlements are far and few between here although there are very small hamlets dotted around the very austere country side. Not that lamb and fish are the only things available to eat here but apart from the one whisky distillery and a couple of craft and pottery places we are hard pressed to know what people do for a living. The answer must be tourism because every second dwelling is a B&B and every tenth commercial business is a hotel of some sort (or restaurant).

During the night the weather turned stormy and we woke to a dull rainy day. We have not had the opportunity to ride our bikes or even go for a reasonable walk for a couple of days because of the steep terrain and the inclement weather. We set off to "see the sights" and ended up driving along a winding, narrow road like we usually do. The brochure told us that the view we would come across on this drive is "the most photographed mountain view in Europe". Our drive was very pleasant but the driving rain meant there was mist in front of us instead of mountains. We did come across the ruins of a church with an interesting history so we stopped for some photos but the rain drove us back into the comfort of the van. At the end of the long road we turned around just as the clouds cleared and the Cuillin mountain range came into view. Absolutely stunning! Taking photographs was not easy because the scale and the breadth of the view made it difficult to get perspective. We spent a good hour simply admiring what was in front of us with no-one else around. The sheep grazing all around could not understand all the fuss - they get to experience this spectacle every day (when it does not rain that is).
